Bottom-freezer refrigerators have the freezer on the bottom of the unit rather than the top. Look for models with special features, such as deli-style doors that let you see inside and make it easy to find your favorite snacks. Bottom-freezer units tend to be larger and more expensive than top-freezer models.

This recall involves Viking built-in 36-inch wide refrigerators with bottom freezers with models and serial numbers/date codes listed below. The model and serial numbers are located on the ceiling of the interior of the refrigerators. The first six numbers in the serial number range are the manufacture date of the unit in (mm)(dd)(yy). Consumers should contact Viking immediately to schedule a free in-home repair. Consumers should stop using the recalled refrigerators if the door does not appear to be sealed properly, the door is sagging or it fails to open or close normally. If the door is working properly, consumers can continue to use the refrigerator until it has been repaired.

Viking has received 39 reports of falling refrigerator doors, including 12 reports of injuries involving a fracture, bruises, strains and cuts, and 25 reports of minor property damage. The 39 new reports are in addition to 57 reports in the previous recall of doors detaching, including four reports of injuries involving bruises, broken toes/fingers, and strains.

I owned a viking 6burner gas range and electric wall oven for 8-9 yrs. I like gas ranges, and the extra power that units like this have. I had a persistent problem w ignition on one burner and I hated the noisiness of the fan built into the wall oven to cool it down when you turn it off (a common issue with newer wall ovens I believe). I did not like viking service. I recently bought a condo that came with Viking built-in appliances. The gas cooktop and built-in oven I can live with, although I don't like them nearly as well as the Gaggenau appliances I have in another house. The Viking refrigerator and the dishwasher totally suck! I can't wait to get them yanked out and replaced with a Sub-Zero fridge and a Miele dishwasher. The Viking refrigerator has a single compressor with cooling in the refrigerator section provided by circulating and exchanging chilled, desiccated air from the freezer compartment into the fridge compartment. Consequently, anything not carefully wrapped or covered, dries out very quickly in the refrigerator section. The Sub-Zero system of two compressors, with no exchange of air between the freezer and refrigerator compartments is far superior. If you're going to go with a high end fridge, be sure to go for one with a dual compressor system. I have an entire Viking kitchen and can tell you that I would never consider purchasing them again. Not only have I spent over \$1500 repairing my refrigerator (\$6,000 cost) over the past 9 years, but have also paid over \$250 to fix my \$1,500 micro/convection oven. I have lived with duct tape holding the button on this microwave for 3 years as I refuse to pay the \$500+ in order to fix it. I am told that the entire sub control system would need to be replaced. After doing research, I found that my Viking is actually a Sharp in disguise. Her is a real money saver... If your button on your over the range microwave has popped out, DO NOT allow them to replace the entire subunit at \$533. Instead, order Sharp part number FDECAB029MRK0, it is the Open Button Assembly. I bought mine from Partstore.com for about \$30. With a little finesse you can remove your old button with no tools. If you remove the stainless steel cover over your existing button, you can place it over the Sharp part and then gently place it back in. Be advised, the reason your button probably popped out was because a small piece of plastic broke inside, likely as a result of steam from your stovetop weakening the plastic. Please be sure to use your fan when cooking on the stove top, or do not use the burner directly below button. Hope this helps, I saved \$500 by doing my homework! Our
